## A Testimony from the 335th Eye Camp in Tanzania



My name is Sujoung Choi, and I participated in the 335th Vision Eye Camp in Tanzania as an optician.

Recently, I took a break from my career and spent time reflecting on myself. I realized that I had a desire to do something meaningful with my career skill-sets, and to explore Africa, so I decided to join the Vision Eye Camp. Due to some personal circumstances that made me hesitate to travel as the date approached, I rather reluctantly boarded the flight to Tanzania.

My role during the Vision Eye Camp was to perform A-scan on patients prior to surgery and to train local opticians to facilitate the examination process. In the beginning, I had a tough time utilizing the A-scan device provided by the hospital because it was different from the ones I am used to back in South Korea. Even though I had practiced several times before the Eye Camp, I felt nervous.



The first patient I examined was one of the local optician's mother, so I got even more nervous at some point, but I was relieved when the examination results came out consistent. It even helped build trust with the optician as well! Despite the rough start, I quickly got used to the environment day after day.

One of the things I noticed from interacting with the patients was that their eye health and nutritional status were worse than I had expected. For instance, there was a patient who could not walk stably coming out of the operating room.

When she came back for a post-op visit, I handed her some vitamins and snacks while gesturing that I was concerned about her. At that moment, I felt that our hearts communicated across the language barrier.

I was also impressed by the patients' outfits. The patients I met at the Eye Camp wore such beautiful clothes, which made me think that they were part of Tanzania's everyday culture. However, when I learned that the patients actually dressed formally or even purchased new clothes to come to the hospital, I was surprised and touched at the same time – they reminded me of my own grandparents and other older adults in my hometown.



The week I spent in Tanzania was also a time for me to newly discover my potential strengths. Throughout the Eye Camp, I felt a strong sense of motivation as I gained more confidence. Instead of the fear and worry that occupied me in the beginning about successfully performing my role, I found myself empowered.

Furthermore, I was deeply inspired by the other volunteers at the Vision Eye Camp who never ceased to put their best efforts during the exhausting schedule.
