Vision Care Celebrates Graduation of Advanced PTC Trainees



From June 26–27, Vision Care led a special Advanced PTC (Phacoemulsification Training Course) in Ras Desta Hospital in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia under the leadership of **Dr. Lisa Park, Dr. Jae Yun Kim, and Dr. Sang Woong Moon**. The advanced course comprised lectures and surgical training involving complicated cases of cataract surgery.

Since 2010, Vision Care has been committed to developing sustainable strategies to improve eye health in Ethiopia. One of our approaches is to empower local health professionals by providing high-quality training programs to selected ophthalmologists and surgical nurses.

Since the launch of PTC and SONTC (Surgical Ophthalmic Nurse Training Course) in Ethiopia, over 20 ophthalmologists and over 40 surgical nurses have completed the training with Vision Care. They have become vital members in their respective university-level hospitals and eye clinics, serving their communities – at times joining Vision Eye Camps in neighboring countries.

We would like to acknowledge our local doctors **Dr. Addis, Dr. Dereje, Dr. Yemisrach, Dr. Gebremedhin, Dr. Kumale, and Dr. Tsedeke** for completing this intensive two-day surgical training program. And thank you, Dr. Park, Dr. Kim, and Dr. Moon for leading the course!
